Below: A quarry and a remaining farm. This land is no longer suitable for agriculture. Rain water fills the quarry which then becomes dangerous to livestock and children who can fall and drown. Mosquitoes breed in the stagnate water increasing the risks of malaria, typhoid and dysentery which are very prevalent among people living around these quarries.







Top: Two men cutting stone in the quarry. There is no machine only hand tools to dig and cut stone. The workers use no protective gear when doing this work.
